Jewish Zionism in the Wake of the Third Reich

Robert Weltsch was both an active Zionist and chief editor of the Jewish newspaper in Germany, *Jüdische Rundschau*.² Weltsch was born in Prague on June 20th, of 1891, when Prague was still a part of Austria-Hungary.³ He grew up in an area that was culturally German, but still held strong Jewish ties.⁴ After World War I, where he had fought for the German offensive, he moved to Berlin where he took his place as editor of this newspaper from 1919 to 1938.⁵ The *Jüdische Rundschau* was a newspaper in Berlin that lasted from 1902 to 1938. It was the largest and most important Zionist weekly newspaper in Germany.⁶ During his time as editor of the *Jüdische Rundschau*, he contributed many speeches, reports, essays, and journals.⁷ These writings by Weltsch mostly dealt with Zionism, Jewish-Arab and Jewish-German relations, displaced persons in post-World War II Europe, the Nuremberg war crimes trials, and the

founding of the State of Israel.⁸ One of Weltsch's more famous contributions to the newspaper was his publication of Wear it With Pride, the Yellow Badge, released on April 4th, 1933.⁹ The original article Weltsch published describes the events, the persecution of Jews, that began on April 1, 1933. All Jewish people were being forced to wear yellow patches, and all Jewish store owners had to put red cards up in front of their stores, so that they could be more easily identified and segregated. In this article Weltsch explains how the persecution of Jews had reached a new height and even predicted that the day would go down in infamy. Ultimately this was one of the many articles written by Weltsch that aimed at steering Jews towards radicalist Zionist ideals. An original version of this newspaper can be found at Goethe University of Frankfurt.¹⁰ One can also find a translated version of this article on the Jewish Virtual libraries website.¹¹ Only nineteen days after the original article was printed, in New York, a newspaper pertaining to this event was printed in the Jewish Bulletin.¹² This article in the Jewish Bulletin informed US readers, specifically Jewish Europeans living in the US, of the events taking place in Germany. Gershom Scholem corresponded with Robert Weltsch and Hans Kohn regarding their Zioinist values, activities, and motives.¹³ Thomas von der Osten-Sacken and Beatrice Smedley referred to this event, and Robert Weltsch, in their 2002 article "Tribulations of a World Zionist Newspaper: The Rise and Fall of the *Jüdische Welt-Rundschau*."¹⁴ Robert Weltsch is a valuable source of information pertaining to Zionism and Jews in Germany. He wrote extensively, portraying the events of Germany and seeing that he was chief editor of the important newspaper, Jüdische *Rundschau*, we can assess that he was credible and therefore a valid source. Many researchers have referred back to his writings and cited his articles in their own research of events that took place in Germany. Robert Weltsch was a product of his time and his writings serve as a great
